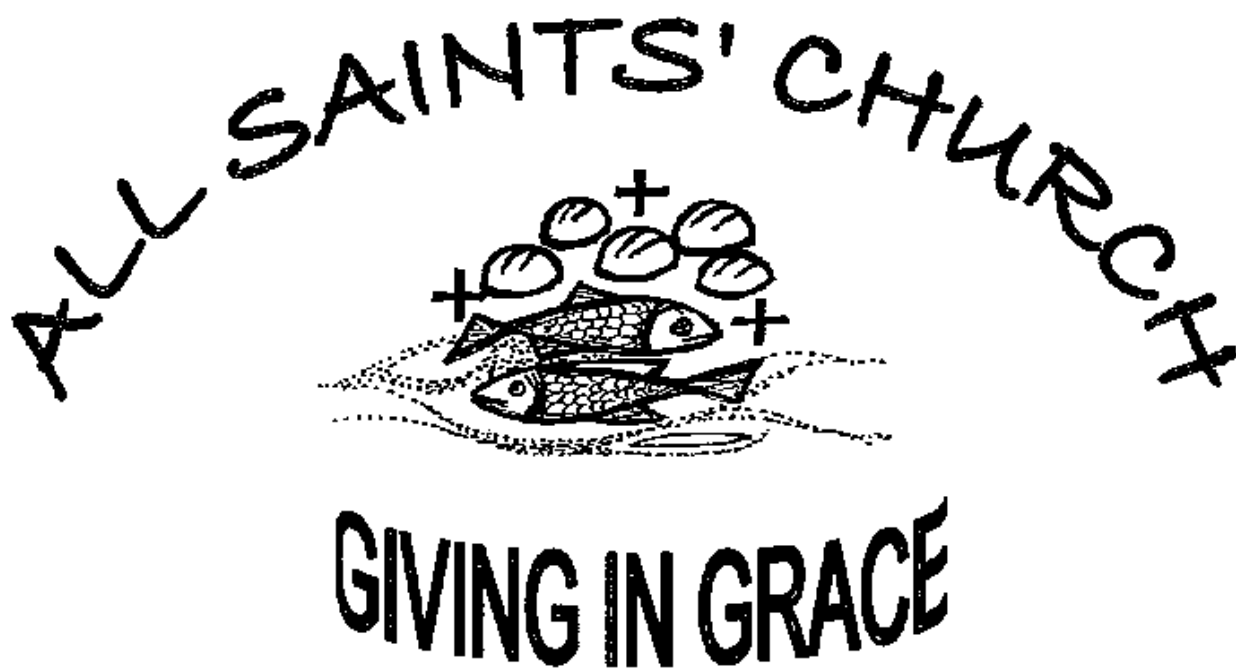


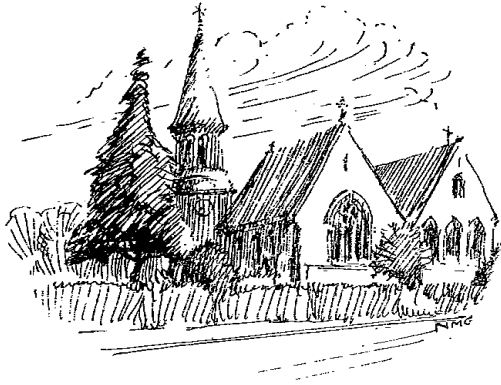

I hope you will take up this opportunity to meet with one of the designated visitors to share your thoughts and views about how we are functioning as a church today and what we should be thinking about doing to ensure our church continues to grow and provide a place for prayer and worship for future generations.

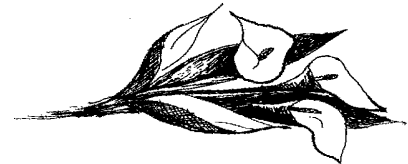
In this post Easter/pre Pentecost period the Sunday gospels focus on Jesus appearing to his disciples as he nurtures and encourages them through their grief and uncertainty about their future. We will hear how Thomas doubted when the other disciples told him they had seen the risen Jesus, how two disciples experienced – without realising initially – Jesus walking with them as they journeyed away from Jerusalem, we will revisit Jesus' teachings about the love God has for each of us and his promise of eternal life to all those who believe in Him. From the death of Jesus to his resurrection and through to Pentecost the disciples, whether they realised it or not, were on a journey of faith in which they were being prepared to take the Good News of Jesus Christ and all that he taught them to others in local areas and beyond.

We too, each and every one of us, are on a journey of faith. We can hide or walk away like the disciples did in the beginning, or we can hold onto, and be inspired by, the amazing truth that Jesus is alive and we are called to share this life with others who do not yet know him. Our church, our worship and the way we love and care for one another is an essential witness of Jesus' living presence.

There are things that we do well and things that we do less well. What is your experience of worship in our church, does it lift your spirit and energise you to go out and share God's love with others? What is your experience of being cared for and nurtured in our church? Are we focussing our funds on the most important aspects of church life and how do we ensure that we have sufficient funds to continue to meet our basic needs of lighting, heating and general maintenance as well as mission and outreach? These are the sort of things that the *Giving in Grace* visitors will be asking you. Please make time to meet with them; we need to hear your thoughts.

May God bless you this Easter-tide and fill you with a new sense of His love and presence.

## Mothers' Union

At our April meeting, our member Nesta Williams told us of some ladies who have followed in the footsteps of Mary Sumner, our founder, passing the knowledge and love of Jesus throughout the world.

In the late 19<sup>th</sup> century the MU was almost unknown and people then, as now at times, thought of it as being a group enjoying a cup of tea together until they found out the opposite. Some ladies had applied to work for the CMS but, on being rejected, found their slot in the work of the MU. One of these was Lady Buxton. Her husband, Lord Buxton, was in the brewing industry and, as a politician, he was sent to be Governor General of Australia. His wife accompanied him and put all her energy into the MU work there. The main headquarters started in the Bishop's Palace in Adelaide but eventually extended to a house, then an office building and the work became the Child Separation Society. Lady Buxton visited as many MU branches as she could, to encourage those affected by fishing tragedies and in poverty. However, she did this whilst being an invalid herself on a spinal bed.

Another lady, in 1920, paid for herself to go to China for the MU, five years after the Boxer Rebellion. She found the people unhappy and frightened to talk to her about Christianity, but one day a nurse gave her some bandages and other medical equipment and she went round with them and gradually people accepted her goods and her message. Eventually the Bible Society was also working in China.

Mrs. Cruttwell, another MU worker, from St Albans, had lost her pastor husband and one son in a motorcycle accident. She heard Bishop Stopford appealing for workers to go to Papua New Guinea and was determined to go, rather than living with her other son in Australia. Papua New Guinea is a beautiful country with mountains down to the sea. People trekked miles over these, to gatherings held in small boats; especially they came to celebrate Lady Day.

In 2006, MU workers in a mission school in Sri Lanka helped to direct people after the tsunami there. They also work in schools in parts of Ruanda. When a mission partner in a school noticed that two girls in her class from the same family had birthdays only two months apart, she found out they were orphans from the genocide there. The MU out there had made a special effort to find homes for these orphans and people with large families each took two children into their care.

In South Africa, Gladys worked 30 years in the MU and in spite of apartheid had a black lady as her secretary. The black lady was given a certificate and somewhere to live.

Then in England, Diana Bandy, an Essex MU Diocesan Council member, was on the Mary Sumner House Committee and worked with Parliament in the '2005 Women's Rights' and prison work. She went to the United Nations in New York, gave a talk there on MU and got a standing ovation there. Since then some MU branches were started in the USA.

So, as Nesta said, the MU is like an onion – each layer works on its own, but bound together great things can be achieved.

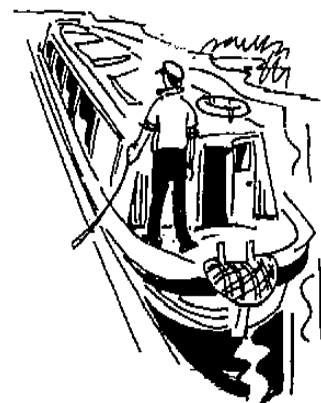

## **Christian Aid Week in Crisis – Can you Help?**

### **15th – 21st May**

All Saints' Church has a wonderful record with Christian Aid and in fact raises well over a thousand pounds regularly during Christian Aid Week – last year we raised £1,453 the largest amount of any church in Croxley.

Our success is largely due to the excellent organisation carried out by my fellow organiser Lucille West during the fifteen years we worked in partnership and to the efficient way that Jean Walford took over from her and carried on with such verve and dedication for the last five years.

Christian Aid Week is always the second week of May. Each year, most people do house-to-house collections in the same patch but inevitably there are gaps. We desperately (and I mean desperately) need a volunteer (or volunteers) to help me organise the rota for this year. This would involve contacting those who normally do it (thank God for these kind people) and then ringing around for new volunteers to fill the inevitable gaps. We have new members in our congregation who, I am sure, will respond to the call.

Then we need another vigorous person to take over the allocation of collection bags and envelopes to our helpers. Once we have collected the money, we need another panel of volunteers to sit down in the church hall beside a long table and bag up the small change. The bank supplies the bags and we need a team, as it took my wife Ann and Jean two whole days to count and collate a very large sum of small change last year.

I have been one of the organisers of Christian Aid Week since 1991. It is a splendid charitable organisation, due to the annual high profile knock on the door that our helpers are so good at. The best method is to put the envelope in during the morning and collect it the same evening – to prevent it from getting ‘lost’.

Ann and I are glad to run the Christian Aid stall, 10am-12 noon on Wednesday 18th outside the Methodist Church in New Road, but again we need your help.

I am definitely no ‘spring chicken’ anymore and I know that after 20 years I cannot run this event without help. Jean gave her help so well, an inspiration to us all – is there anyone out there who will heed our plea for help?

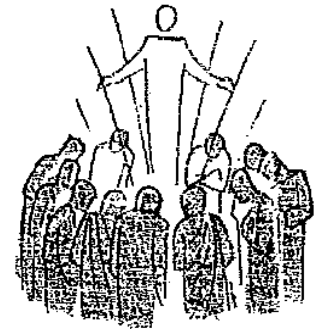

## **To the Woods**

How many woods are within five miles of our church? Ten? Twenty? In fact there are 41. And how did I find this out? There is a new website [VisitWoods.org.uk](http://VisitWoods.org.uk) which tells you all you might want to know about your local woods, such as which ones are good for bluebells, autumn colour, wheelchair access....

For each wood, there is a map and anyone who visits can add photos and extra information, for example about plants, animals, history, so that a valuable resource will develop.

Also on the website are videos, including how to build a den; pond dipping; identifying trees and birds; parkour (free-running, over tree stumps and other obstacles, without stopping). And for less active people there are instructions for knitting bluebells!

So, from Croxley Hall Woods to the rest of Britain, if you are looking for a wood to visit this is the website to use.

## **Book review: Follow me: becoming a liberated disciple by John Valentine**

'Christ did not die to make us Christians. He died to make us human.' So said Archbishop Oscar Romero of El Salvador, who was shot dead, martyred for following Jesus in the face of government opposition in 1980.

'The great discovery for me in recent years', says John Valentine, the author, in his preface, is that following Jesus makes us more human, not less so. Even though Jesus says things like 'whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it', he does so in the context of how we most truly discover ourselves. Jesus invites us to live life well, really well, far beyond contemporary society's bland definitions and assumptions about the good life.

The book is an invitation to follow Jesus, to be his disciples, to trust him enough to pattern our very lives on his life; to interact with God so as to lead lives that somehow reflect God and make a lasting impact on the world around us. This is not morality, though there will be a good many moral consequences and out-workings along the way.

Each chapter begins with an example of an ordinary situation and the questions it raises for the people concerned and then goes on to elaborate how it links with being a Christian. For example the first chapter is headed 'Learning to do life' and starts with the story of a couple adoring their newly born baby. Every chapter considers an aspect of following Jesus through our own lives being changed as we, one at a time, get involved in God's church. What does it mean to be a *liberated* disciple? Not necessarily being happy and fulfilled or having all our dreams come to pass. But it does mean we shall be liberated from our lesser concerns as we find the source, joy and meaning of our lives in God and his cosmic plans in Jesus Christ. The most hope filled adventure that there is.

This book would make a marvellous present for someone going forward for confirmation or a useful refresher course for anyone who feels it is a long time since they first became church members. I would be happy to get copies for anyone who would like one [£7.99] and there is a copy in the Church library.

On Sunday after church, a mother asked her very young daughter what the lesson in Sunday School had been about. Her daughter answered, "Don't be scared, you'll get your quilt."

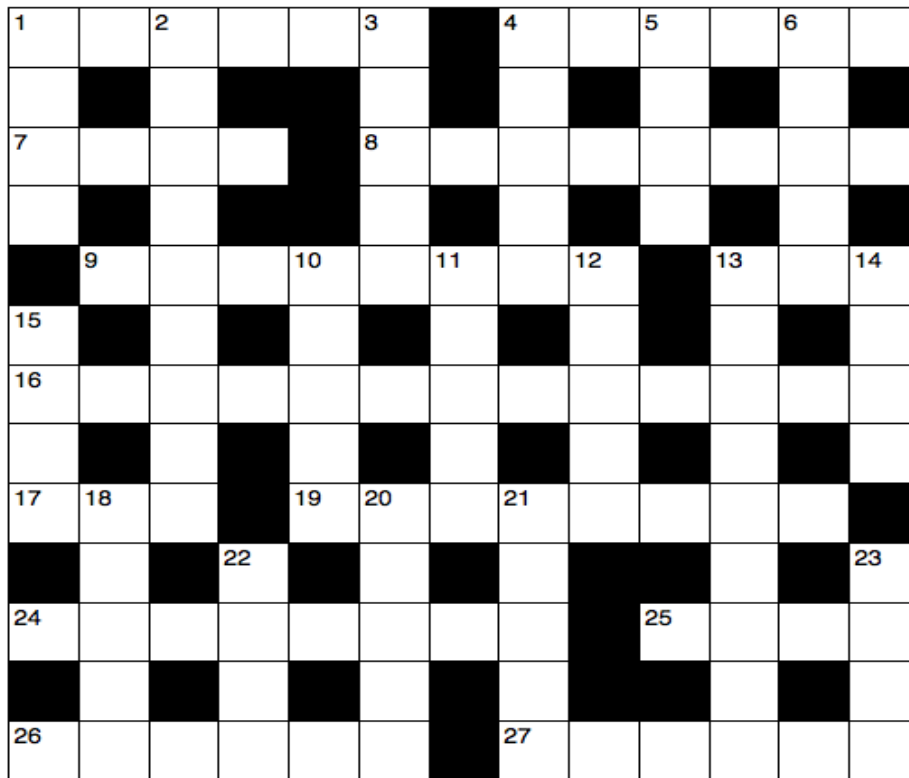
