#### **Revd. Canon Miriam writes:**

Dear Friends,

It was a little disappointing that only 13 people attended the Parish Half Day last month. However, we were able to reflect and give thanks

for the way God has blessed us in our work and outreach during 2022 and explore where God might be at work in our Church at the moment. At the Parish Morning in 2022, we decided that we would look to see where God is at work in our Church/community and join in rather than trying to impose our own plans and ideas. We agreed that, as God has blessed us so much in the last year, we would continue with this way of being and growing our Church. Prayer and waiting on God was a recurrent theme in our discussions at this year's Parish Day so we decided that we would spend some time in prayer, waiting on God over the coming months to discern where and what he is calling us to as individuals, a community of faith, and a Church serving the community of Croxley Green. We will explore this further in the next Pastoral and Evangelism Group and I will keep you updated.

At the Parish Day we focused on a passage of scripture: 2 Corinthians 12 verses 12-27. This passage talks about how we are the body of Christ and that each and every one of us has a specific role and purpose and each and every one of us is important. Just as each part of the human body has a vital role to play if we are to remain healthy, so it is with a church community, the body of Christ. So please don't think that you have nothing to offer, or that you are not important in our Church community because you are called by God to be a blessing in this community. For our Church to grow and be effective in serving God, one another and our neighbour your presence and input is essential.

I wonder if you read about the comments that our Archbishop, Justin Welby, made recently at the Religion Media Centre's Festival in

London? The issue of falling church attendance was raised, and the Archbishop said that he felt some accountability for the declining numbers in our churches. I have to say that I don't agree with him and I don't blame him at all for the situation the national church is in. I think changes in society over the last few decades, the impact of the Covid pandemic and the reluctance of some churches to change in order to meet the changing needs is perhaps why numbers are dropping. Looking at the national church attendance figures pre and post pandemic there has been an overall 19% reduction in numbers attending church. When I looked at our numbers at All Saints' over the same period we have managed to buck the trend and we have seen a 7% increase in the number of people attending our church! This, I think, is a sign of God's blessing and grace. We have allowed him to lead us as we developed more accessible services, deepened our faith, and built up our relationships with God, each other and the local community. And YOU have played a key role in this. Being who you are and sharing the gifts that God has given you as you have supported and encouraged, welcomed and prayed, has enabled God's purposes for our Church to develop and grow, so thank YOU, and may God continue to bless you as you bless us.

As always, there is lots going on at All Saints'. Over the summer the major Hall Refurbishment Project will get under way. We are hopeful that the works will be completed by the start of September. There is more information about this further on in the Magazine.

Those of you who attended the concert organised by Vicky Vandy during the Flower Festival last year will remember what an amazing event it was, better than attending the Proms at the Albert Hall I heard some people say. I am so excited that Vicky has once again gathered the orchestra together for another concert to take place on Saturday 15th July at 7.30pm. Tickets are available on line via our web page or from the Parish Office, this is an event not to be missed so make sure you let everyone know. Why not bring a group of friends with you?

During August we are exploring the possibility of running the Thursday Pop Up Café for carers of children under 5 and the Friday Café. Both will need to be held in Church. Can you help? Can you spare a couple of hours to help with refreshments on one of the weeks? Can you bake cakes? Any way in which you can help, whether large or small will be so gratefully received; please let me know.



#### Virtual Balloon Race

A virtual race works in the same way as a helium balloon race, but the balloons fly around their own virtual island rather than in the atmosphere.



## 29<sup>th</sup> July Olaf

#### King and patron saint of Norway

If you led a wild life before your conversion, then Olaf is the saint for you. Indeed, anything you have done could hardly match him, for he was a brigand and pirate who roamed the Baltic and Normandy around 1015 AD, maining and killing, stealing and destroying, feared by all.


Then on one particular raid off Normandy, Olaf met his match: he boarded a ship with Christians on it and was converted to Christianity. The shock of this sent him inland, off the ships, to England, where he joined forces with Ethelred II for a time. But soon his entrepreneurial spirit was asserting itself, and an ambition was born: to return to Norway and convert the country to Christianity.

Olaf was never a man to do things meekly: he sailed for Norway and, helped by his own military ability and the flight of his rivals, seized power and became King. Once king, Olaf gave his subjects peace and security. He remade old laws, and insisted on their just execution, ignoring all bribes or threats.

Above all, Olaf began to convert the country. He was helped by a number of Viking converts and English monks who were missionaries to Norway. But the old paganism was strong in many places, and soon there was a rebellion. Olaf was exiled in 1029 and died the following year in a battle to regain his throne.

He was buried, but his story did not end there. For Christianity had established a foothold that would grow and grow. And it was soon reported that springs of healing water flowed from Olaf's grave, and miracles happened. So Grimkell, the English bishop of Trondheim, built a chapel on the site of his grave and declared him a saint. Olaf's cult grew in popularity until by 1070 his feast day was celebrated throughout Scandinavia. He was popular in England too, with about 40 ancient churches dedicated to him, possibly due to benefactors of Viking origin.

On 3<sup>rd</sup> July the Church remembers St Thomas, also called Doubting Thomas, because he would not believe his fellow disciples' news of the Resurrection. But 'doubt' did not mean that Thomas did not love Jesus! Only a few weeks before, Thomas had urged his fellow disciples to follow Jesus to see Lazarus in Bethany, despite danger from the Jews. "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John 11:16) Instead, Jesus had brought Lazarus back to life. Thomas was

sometimes very confused about just where Jesus was headed. But in John 14:5 Jesus untangled his confused commitment: "I am going to my Father", and "No one comes unto the Father but by me." Finally, after the Resurrection, Jesus appeared to showing him the wounds of His Thomas. crucifixion. Thomas was electrified. and his "My immediate: response Lord and my God" (John 20.26ff). Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of people down the centuries.
