

Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

In my letter last month, I reflected on the image of August being a time of long, lazy summer days, a

time of holidays and opportunities to re-charge our batteries. I hope that you have been able to take some time out from your usual routine and enjoy the sunshine that did happen sometimes between the rain showers!

There were no long lazy days for the workmen involved in our Hall refurbishment! Work has progressed really well thanks to Sam Jones' meticulous project management and with the support of the Hall Management Team. All being well, by the time you read this, the work will be almost complete. I hope that you are as excited as I am to see what it will look like.

As we move into September, there are a number of activities to look forward to. We have the **Tea Dance** on 16th September organised by our friends from the British Legion to raise funds for the Hall Refurbishment Project. I do hope you will be able to come along and join us for this event which promises to be great fun. Our Harvest Festival Service is on 17th September and will be followed by a Barbecue at 12 noon (further details about this can be found later in this magazine). Our harvest gifts will be passed on to New Hope, a charity that supports homeless people locally. There is some information about the work that this charity does along with some ideas for items that they would find most useful further on in the magazine. Please do not bring fresh or perishable produce as the shelf life for such items is too short. We are also planning to have a Choral Evensong at 6pm on the 17th September. This is such a lovely and reflective service at the closing of the day so please do come along if you are able to.

We are also planning to run an Exploring Faith Course for those who would like to find out more about the Christian faith. It is open to everyone whether you have been churchgoers for decades or have only recently joined us and is a great opportunity to explore, discuss and share our thoughts, views and experiences of being a Christian. We are planning to run the course at 7.30pm on Monday evenings starting on 18th September for 6 weeks. If evenings are difficult for you and you would prefer a daytime course then please speak to me, I am happy to organise this if there are enough people interested.

In my last letter I wrote about our need to reflect, pray and wait on God as we seek to serve him and grow our Church spiritually and numerically. Praying for our Church is something that we can all be involved in. I am sure that many of you already faithfully hold the work, mission and ministry of All Saints' in your prayers and I am truly grateful that you do this. To further develop this, we will allocate Thursdays as a collective day of prayer for our Church. We currently say Morning Prayer in Church on Thursday mornings at 8am and we have a Thursday morning service at 9.30pm. At both of these services we will intentionally include prayers for God's guidance for the growth and development of our work and ministry here at All Saints'.

Can you also set aside time for similar prayer at home every Thursday? I am a great believer that God hears our prayers, and He will respond, we just need to make the time and space to pray and importantly to listen to what he might want to say to us; '*Then you will call on me. You will come and pray to me, and I will listen to you.*' Jeremiah 29.

For those unable to attend either of the services on Thursdays but would value an opportunity to pray for our Church with others there will be opportunities to do this at 5pm on:

This year we will be donating our Harvest Gifts to New Hope Charity which supports Homeless People in the local area.

New Hope is a Christian charity which provides accommodation and personalised support to help people in Watford and Three Rivers escape homelessness for good. We exist to serve those who have fallen between the cracks of social provision and care. Up to 52 people every night are provided with a safe place to stay and over 500 people each year receive support through our intervention, recovery and prevention services including:

- Street outreach
- A drop-in centre
- Accommodation for people in recovery from rough sleeping, alcohol and substance misuse
 - Support for wellbeing, mental health and addiction,
 - Tenancy support for people moving into their own homes.

The people who come to us are chefs or builders, teachers or office workers, sons, daughters or parents and something has gone wrong, something often outside of their control. We prioritise the people who would otherwise have limited options for housing and support such as people rough sleeping or those with no access to benefits. Additionally, we work with people to help them access or maintain permanent homes.

"After spending some time chatting with staff (at the Haven), I was referred to New Hope's Emergency Accommodation and had a room that night! I was completely taken aback. I went from a situation where I thought I'd be sleeping in the park, to being welcomed into a room, with food to eat and people to talk to." Anon, a service user

For someone rough sleeping or at immediate risk of street homelessness in Watford, New Hope's Haven is the only place they can go for immediate access to food, clean clothes, a shower and support. The Haven is operated by highly-skilled staff who offer advice and support with a range of issues including housing, benefits, debt, drugs and alcohol and who work with service users to obtain vital documentation such as birth certificates and bank accounts.

Eco Church Bronze Award

For several years a small team of us has worked on helping All Saints' work towards this Bronze Award. It is a scheme set up by a Christian charity called A Rocha which works to protect and restore the natural world and to help Christians and churches to care for the environment. We felt that this was an important thing for us to be involved in here at All Saints' and so we set to work.

There are five categories of questions which we worked through:

- Worship and teaching how often is the natural world featured in prayers, hymns, sermons, newsletters, magazines?
 - Management of Church Buildings are buildings insulated and double glazed? Is our energy from a green tariff? Are light bulbs low energy? Is paper recycled and usage reduced? Do we encourage walking/cycling? Do we have recycling facilities?
 - Management of Church Land do we manage our land to encourage nature: bird feeders, plants for insects, water for animals? Do we participate in nature surveys? Do we use our land for relaxation or recreation?
 - Community and Global Engagement linking with local government, environmental charities and other churches; being involved in local environmental projects; enjoying nature through organised events; supporting environmental projects around the world; participating in sustainability events like Earth Hour; being a Fairtrade Church. Do we generate energy?
 - Lifestyle encouraging people at an individual level to reduce their use of resources and energy; to recycle; to invest ethically; work out their carbon footprint; Church has a team to work on environmental issues and awareness.

We worked through the many questions in each category and found that we were actually doing better than we expected. We were doing well on some areas already so we highlighted others where we thought we could make a difference and we set to work. We set up bird feeders, (thanks to those who donated feeders and food); we worked out what we could recycle at Church and set up stations for collecting soft plastics, batteries and stamps; we changed the lightbulbs in Church to low energy ones and have used new lights in the Hall Refurbishment; we set up a box in the office for waste paper which could be reused for notes.

There are some things which we will be unable to achieve: installing a composting/waterless toilet; running a food co-operative; insulating our Church building. However, we have highlighted a range of issues which we will be working on in the next few months so watch this space.



We can all make a difference, even with small changes. If you would like to find out more, please talk to one of our team, and do let us know if you make changes and how you get on. There is also more information on www.arocha.org.uk.








God you are the best person in the whole world! You made all the animals, like dogs, cats and hamsters which are so lovely and fluffy and are nice to cuddle.

Neither Here Nor There (likes and dislikes)

In my last contribution to the magazine, I wrote about the people I had met with curious names. A few days later, Gretel and I were with a group of Christian Leaders in Nottingham. We met in the home of a businessman with the surname of 'Smellie' who runs an I.T business with his friend who has the surname of 'Savage'. YES – you have guessed it, their business cards bear the name 'Smellie Savage'- you really could not make it up!!

I would have to include just one more. I preached in a church in South India where the Pastor's Christian name was 'Citybus'. I just had to ask him where the name originated. His Mother had visited London in the early stages of her pregnancy and had observed a bus, adorned with the title of 'City Bus' and she had taken to it – simple as that. I loved travelling in India and visiting their churches, it is such a vibrant, if chaotic, country that violently assaults all your senses (Vision, Taste etc) at the same time. The largest church I preached in, in the city of Chennai, had a congregation of over 10,000. In the State of Kerala, there are still churches that were established in the 1st century by the Apostle Thomas and that bear his name. The ones I saw had a kind of Anglican format. Apparently, St Thomas travelled all over India. Such was the impact of his meeting with Jesus, that changed 'Doubting Thomas' into a valiant soldier of Christ. It's only when we meet with Christ in a personal way that we are changed from being Followers to Disciples, with a passion to know Christ and to make Him known.

Enough of names for now, so, let me become provocative by writing about the things we like and dislike. How truly amazing it is that tastes differ so much. When I read The Times letters page, I find that two people can have such diverse views on the same subject. After all is said and done, how can you possibly compare Boris and Rishi (of course, it has to be Boris!) I was raised in a home where it was always Bovril and never Marmite and so it has remained. There is not much better in an evening than a slice of toast, with a liberal layer of Bovril, plus a touch of Black Pepper. I have heard it said, but find it hard to believe, that in some English homes, they even give room to that vilest of all Australian concoctions (in my opinion) Vegemite. I found myself violently opposed to one, moderately disliking another and quite liking the third.

All I will say is that one of the hymns mentioned featured at my wedding to Gretel, 60 years ago this year, so I have to like that one. OK, you might ask, which ones would you pick? That's quite hard, as there have been some good ones written these past few years, so I will have to confine myself to the more traditional ones. My top three would have to be (1) 'To be a Pilgrim' (2) 'And can it be that I should gain' (3) 'Oh for a thousand tongues'. By the way, I think Gretel's favourite (although I haven't asked her recently) would be 'Dear Lord and Father of Mankind'. I suspect that when she reached a certain line, she probably sings 'Forgive Ron's foolish ways'.



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
