Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

It seems strange to be writing this letter for the October Parish Magazine and trying to get my head into autumn whilst trying to cope with the heat on what is likely to be the hottest day of the year in September! No doubt by the time you read this letter the weather will have a much more autumnal feel to it. What is apparent though is the shortening of daylight hours with sunrise getting later and sunset getting earlier. Don't forget that at the end of this month the clocks go back an hour.

So, what can we look forward to in October? Well, on Sunday 8th October at 11.30am we will have our annual Blessing of Animals Service. Please come along with your pet and invite others that you know who have a pet. It is such a lovely, short service to give God thanks for the love and joy that our pets give to us and to pray generally for all animals and creatures of God's creation. Those of you who have had a pet that has died will know the depth of sadness this leaves us with as we grieve for them. During this service there is also an opportunity to light a candle in memory of them.

Later in October on 20th - 22nd we will be holding our second Beer Festival. This wonderful event is such a great opportunity to open our church to the local community for fellowship and fun and to give them perhaps a different view of what being a church is all about.

Did you know that there is an historic link between churches and beer festivals and that in running a beer festival we are simply going back to our roots? According to the online encyclopaedia Wikipedia:

“The Parish ale or church ale was a party or festivity in an English Parish at which ale was the chief drink. It was typically a fundraising for the parish that might include music and dancing.

These parish festivals (often held on specific feast days such as Whitsun Saints' days etc) were of much ecclesiastical and social importance in medieval England. The chief purpose of the church-ale (which was originally instituted to honour the church saint) was to facilitate the collection of parish dues and to make a profit for the church from the sale of ale by the church wardens. These profits kept the parish church in repair or were distributed as alms to the poor."

So even back in the Middle Ages the church was not just used for services but were places that brought the community together for fun as well as providing care.

We've lost much of this vibrancy over the centuries with the formality and narrowness of religious outlook and church life. But we want, indeed we need our churches to be places not only of vibrant and inclusive worship but also places where community can gather and have fun and fellowship, a place where God can be found and known in all sorts of ways.

Where is God in all this you might be thinking? Well, we only need to look in the gospels to see that Jesus was often to be found at a party (and always criticised by the religious leaders of the day for being there). He came to show us through what he said and did how we should welcome everyone into the Kingdom of God which he often compared to a banquet, a party, a feast or a festival. So do come and join us as we share with others the joy of God's kingdom here on earth.

Looking further ahead to the beginning of November we will be holding our annual Service of Remembrance for Loved Ones Who Have Died at 10.30am on 4th November. This beautiful reflective service which gives people an opportunity to place a flower in a display and light a candle for the altar in memory of loved ones brings much comfort to those who attend. Everyone is welcome to attend, if you have a neighbour or friend who has recently lost a loved one why not bring them along. The sheets for you to add names to be read out during the service will be available in Church in early

Sunday 5th November is All Saints' Day and our Patronal Festival so do join us for our worship at 9.45am as we celebrate and give thanks for God's saints, known and unknown.

As we continue to reflect prayerfully on what God has in store for us as we seek to grow His kingdom, may we be encouraged by the passage below from Ephesians Chapter 3 verse 20:

God can do anything, far more than you could ever imagine or guess or request in your wildest dreams! He does it by working within us, his Spirit moving deeply and gently within us. May we see His shining greatness in the church. The Message/NLV

Perhaps you can put this passage somewhere that you will see it each day to read and to be encouraged by. You may also like to offer the following prayer each day:

God of Mission Who alone brings growth to your Church, Send your Holy Spirit to give Vision to our planning, Wisdom to our actions, And power to our witness. Help our church to grow in numbers, In spiritual commitment to you, And in service to our local community, Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Leading your church into growth prayer)



We protect and support children and young people, providing practical and emotional care and support. We ensure their voices are heard, and campaign to bring lasting improvements to their lives. Our headquarters is Ascot Road in Watford. We work in communities to offer practical and caring support to children and families

We're on hand to help, when families need us. Our 447 local services allow us to work on the ground, in communities.

We offer a huge range of support. This includes help for families with disabled children, and services for young carers. It includes free or low-cost parenting classes through our children's centres. It includes running events for prospective foster parents.

The Family Partners programme is our groundbreaking solution. It gets help to parents early, and gives them life-changing skills and support.

Family Partners is an intensive support service delivered in the home over 22 weeks. It helps families prevent and reverse child neglect. It does this by teaching positive change. We work with parents to overcome their difficulties.

81% of parents say they feel more confident after completing the programme. Children's behaviour improves, too.

A disabled child should have the same opportunities as any other child. But caring for a disabled child or young person can be challenging. Even the most experienced parents and carers need someone to turn to for help and advice.

The tailored support we offer helps families cope – and gives disabled children a chance to thrive. Last year, we helped more than 22,000 disabled children, young people and their families with our specialist services.

Mental Health

We make sure young carers get regular breaks, and can join in fun activities with other young people. Events, outings and meet-ups are chance to pause responsibilities and enjoy being a child for a few

hours. This is really important to resilience and mental wellbeing. We offer practical and emotional support to ensure young carers enjoy and achieve, just like their peers.

Young people need chances to thrive – when they have this, it’s life-changing. Our services create opportunity. And they speak up for those left behind. We help through:

- Placements, apprenticeships and skills workshops.
- Protecting young people from organised crime.
- Offering support in court or custody.
- Stepping in to stop young people becoming homeless.

I’ve just returned from Annual Leave to be given the wonderful news by our finance team that they received a cheque from All Saints’ Church.

Thank you so much – this will help us to provide vital services for local people with learning disabilities. PCC Meeting on 6 September

Talk on the Trinity Project

Revd. Simon Cutmore, Vicar of Mill End and Heronsgate, gave a talk on the Trinity Project, which aims to become a charity working in partnership with local schools and churches to improve local young people's emotional literacy and to reduce their experience of loneliness and anxiety.

Hall Refurbishment

Sam Jones, Chair of the Hall Committee, reported that the Hall refurbishment was almost complete, with only the curtains to be ordered and fitted. It had all been achieved within the allocated budget. 100 new chairs would be ordered to replace some of the old existing chairs. Sam tendered her resignation from the Hall committee as she needed to give additional time to her training for ordination.

Finance Report

Andrew Nobbs reported that the accounts for the year to 31 August showed a deficit of £7,109.19 on the Church account and a surplus of £38.00 on the Hall account, a net deficit of £7,071.19. Although the retained surplus on the 2022 accounts should cover a deficit for 2023, we need to reduce the deficit as much as possible so as to protect the parish reserves during the next few years.

Safeguarding Matters

The PCC reviewed and approved the following church activities for the current year:

Church Choir; Youth Group; Afternoon Teas; Monday Toddlers Group; Friday Drop-in Cafes and Pop-up Cafés for young children.

Each activity has a minimum of one leader with a job description, a supporting person who is a member of the PCC and risk assessments, annually reviewed, which enabled the activity to be covered by the Church insurance.

Ongoing safeguarding training, including award of DBS certificates, is proceeding.

Church Clock – Installation of Autowind Mechanism

John Galloway reported that Smith of Derby had installed the autowind electronic system to wind and regulate the clock, replacing the hand-operated system. The new system had been largely financed by a very generous donation and funding of the VAT element by the

Listed Places of Worship grant scheme. The PCC approved an annual service agreement with Smith of Derby.

Charity Commission - Personalised Accounts for Online Access to Records and Services

The Charity Commission has changed its procedures for charity trustees or officers to access or update the records they have sent to the Commission. From henceforth people accessing or updating their details will need to open a personal account with the Commission. Chris Fagan, PCC Secretary, can provide further information.

The Church Organ

The PCC is seeking to have the organ tuned and surveyed to ascertain how much some essential repairs might cost. The total cost will be £400. Our regular organists David Heath and Simon Dunn have been involved in these discussions. Grant funding for part of any future refurbishment works is possible. It is hoped the organ firm's visit will take place during October.

Planning for Future Events

Beer Festival, 20-22 October

The PCC considered selling commemorative engraved glasses bearing the All Saints' logo to customers, which was agreed at a subsequent meeting. The cost will be £5. All food will be prepared and sold by members of our congregation. Both of these will boost the Church's income.

Christmas Market, 18 November



Going 'out back' with no light.


The interesting items we perused,

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
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Wordsearch - St Luke

To St Luke, whose feast day is 18th October, we owe a beautifully written gospel as well as the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician and faithful travelling companion to St Paul. Under house arrest near the end of his life Paul noted, 'only Luke is with me'. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ, and offers us moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than in any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner. His gospel also features more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners', who are all shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. In Acts, Luke skilfully links sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. He tells of how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.

Off the back of my first ordinand residential, where I did ten hours of lectures in 24 hours, it felt a big ask of myself. I made it, and also managed to get out of the door at 7.30am on Monday for another day at college.

I would like to thank all of those who came in person to the service, those who sent messages and cards and those who prayed for me; your support on this journey means so much to me. To know you are praying for me and supporting me as I continue to explore the call I feel God has placed on my life is so important. So, please, do continue to hold me in prayer.

As part of my training, I am privileged to hear from some amazing theologians. Rowan Williams' wife, Jane, spoke to all of the ordinands at the start of our course about why she believes we should study theology. And so I would encourage you all, whether alone in Bible study, a chat about a Gospel reading over coffee, as part of an exploring faith course or something such as the St Albans Certificate in Theology, to keep studying. Keep being curious about the beauty of God and all that he has revealed to you and will continue to show you as you journey with him and those around you.

In summary, I leave you with the words of Paul who says what I have but with far more eloquence:

'Therefore, encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing.' (1Thess 5 v 11)

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


