

Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

We enjoyed an excellent evening of entertainment and good food on Saturday 11th November when Steve Martin and his band, Eleventh Hour, played music from the 60s, 70s and beyond and Wendy and her team cooked a lovely curry for us all to

enjoy. This fantastic event raised just under $\pounds 1,800$ for the Hall Refurbishment Fund. This will be used to decorate the entrance lobby to the Hall. Thank you so much to Steve and his band and Wendy and her team.

The following week we had our annual Christmas Market, an event not to be missed. As always, people come in droves to get those early Christmas gifts, treat themselves to mulled wine and enjoy the lovely seasonal food from the kitchen. Thank you to Ann and Lyndon Palmer who led the organisation of this event and the team that supported them in so many essential ways...setting up and clearing away stalls, helping on our Church stalls, beavering away in the kitchen and on the refreshments, selling prize draw tickets and generally helping out. Without you, this would not be the fantastic event that it always is so thank you so much. Thank you also to the generous sponsors of the main prizes, and donations for the other prizes. We raised an amazing £6,620

At this time of year, I love to read and reflect on the poem Advent 1955 by John Betjeman. The words written in 1955 still ring true for us today.

The Advent wind begins to stir With sea-like sounds in our Scotch fir, It's dark at breakfast, dark at tea......

For now we feel the world spin round On some momentous journey bound -Journey to what? to whom? to where? The Advent bells call out 'Prepare, Your world is journeying to the birth Of God made Man for us on earth.' Advent is a time of preparation and whilst the secular drive over the coming weeks is about preparing for a "perfect" Christmas Day with lots of presents, food and goodwill (which we know in reality brings more stress than good cheer) we, as followers of Jesus Christ, are called to a more focussed even sombre time of reflection.

The Advent bells call out 'Prepare, Your world is journeying to the birth Of God made Man for us on earth.'

We are encouraged to use the time of Advent (which in the church calendar is a penitential season which is why the altar covering, vestments etc. are purple) to reflect on where we are in our spiritual journey and in our preparation for meeting Jesus when he comes again. It can be very challenging living with both the secular and spiritual demands of the Advent season, but I do hope that you will be able to set time aside to journey with God to the sacred and joyful celebration of Christmas. To help you with this, on pages 8 and 9, there are some ideas of books that you might find helpful. They all have a daily reading, reflection and prayer.

Each day's reading finishes with a question for reflection and a prayer.



Themes of racial justice, hospitality and





Waiting on the Word: A poem a day for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany

Advent is a season of waiting and anticipation in which the waiting itself is strangely rich and fulfilling. Poetry can help us fathom the depths of Advent's many paradoxes: dark and light, emptiness and fulfilment, ancient and ever new. For every day from Advent Sunday to Christmas Day and beyond, the bestselling poet Malcolm Guite chooses a favourite poem from across the Christian spiritual and English literary traditions and offers incisive



seasonal reflections on it. In the spirit of the season, he blends the familiar and the new, ranging from from spiritual classics such as Edmund Spenser, John Donne, George Herbert and Christina Rossetti, to contemporary voices Luci Shaw and Scott Cairns. His own acclaimed sequence of sonnets for the great Advent antiphons are also included.

Mary's Voice: Advent Reflections to Contemplate the Coming of Christ

At Christmastime we remember that an ordinary, young, poor, oppressed woman was chosen to play a significant and breakthrough role in the redemption of the world. It is no mistake that a woman gets to be a part of all this, and that her voice, her questions, her fears, and her actions matter.

Mary's faith and her wisdom form an astonishing aspect of the story of how God became a person for the love of this world. And in our weary world that is waiting and longing for light, meaning, peace, and love, we can do as Mary did when she "treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart."

Notes from the PCC Meeting : 1st November 2023

Membership

Wendy Shafe was co-opted onto the PCC to fill a vacancy for a lay member. Wendy is also Chair of the Hall Committee.

Hall Refurbishment

The PCC was informed that the planned works had been completed within the available funding. They therefore accepted quotations for additional works to redecorate the entrance hallway with new lighting and replacement of radiators in the hallway and the ladies' toilets. The stage carpeting is in poor condition and is a trip hazard. It was agreed to post a notice that anyone using the stage does so at their own risk. The Hall Committee is investigating possible replacement surfacing.

Beer Festival, 20-22 November

This had been very successful in terms of visitor numbers and a good atmosphere during all three days. Many favourable comments had been received from visitors, with particular praise for the quality of the food supplied by a team led by Wendy Shafe. The Church had made nearly £1,000 profit from food sales, more than £1,400 from Prize Draw ticket sales and received a generous donation of £700 from the organiser, Scott McGarvey of the Anchor, Tap and Bottle. Church members had worked hard, being involved in planning the event, food preparation and serving, staffing the bar, and preparing the Church and re-ordering the Church after the Festival.

Finance Report

Latest figures for October showed deficits of £4,535 on the Church account and £845.70 on the Hall account. Although a year-end deficit of £11,000 was allowed for, it was desirable to seek to reduce this in order to safeguard the parish's financial reserves. The Christmas Market and Prize Draw ticket sales would be crucial for improving the finances for 2023.

Safeguarding

The PCC adopted a safeguarding protocol for signature by all users of Church premises for non-church purposes involving children or vulnerable adults. Hall hirers must either submit their own organisation's safeguarding policy or adhere to All Saints' policy which requires at least two adults to be present throughout the event. The policy will be reviewed every two years.

Financial Assistance for All Saints' Church, Chedgrave, Norfolk Following a request made to all churches dedicated to All Saints, the PCC donated £50 to the church at Chedgrave to assist with the costs of repairing and protecting vandalised historic stained glass window panels.

Charities to be supported during 2024

The PCC will decide at its December meeting which four charities to support, using donations for after-service refreshments If you have any suggestions please talk to Miriam or Fran Bennett, who is drawing up a list.

Sanctuary Carpet

The PCC was informed that the carpet is in a very poor condition. It was agreed to proceed with the purchase of a new carpet of the same colour using money held in the Legacy Fund.

Floor Cleaning

Some minor damage and wear to the Hall flooring is being repaired free of charge by the installer. The PCC is investigating the purchase of a new cleaning machine to clean the Church and the Hall floors without making them too wet.

All-Age Communion Services

The PCC supported Miriam's proposal for an all-age service on Sunday 5th November involving a substantial involvement of young people, including the option of receiving the communion chalice from a young person on a trial basis.

Other Church Matters

The PCC received reports on a further intruder into the Church, without any thefts so far, on the discovery of a glis-glis in the kitchen which had led to the appointment of a pest controller and ingress of water into the boiler room after heavy rainfall. The Church insurance policy might cover an inspection of the drains for tree root damage.


Curry was served at the start of the evening and then the band played until it was time for ice-creams and for the Raffle to be drawn. A big thank you to everybody who generously donated a prize.



On the ninth day of Christmas, by lunchtime dad was blotto, He knew that bird was back again, this time as a risotto.


On the tenth day of Christmas we were drinking home-made brew, Anything to help us face that steaming turkey stew.
