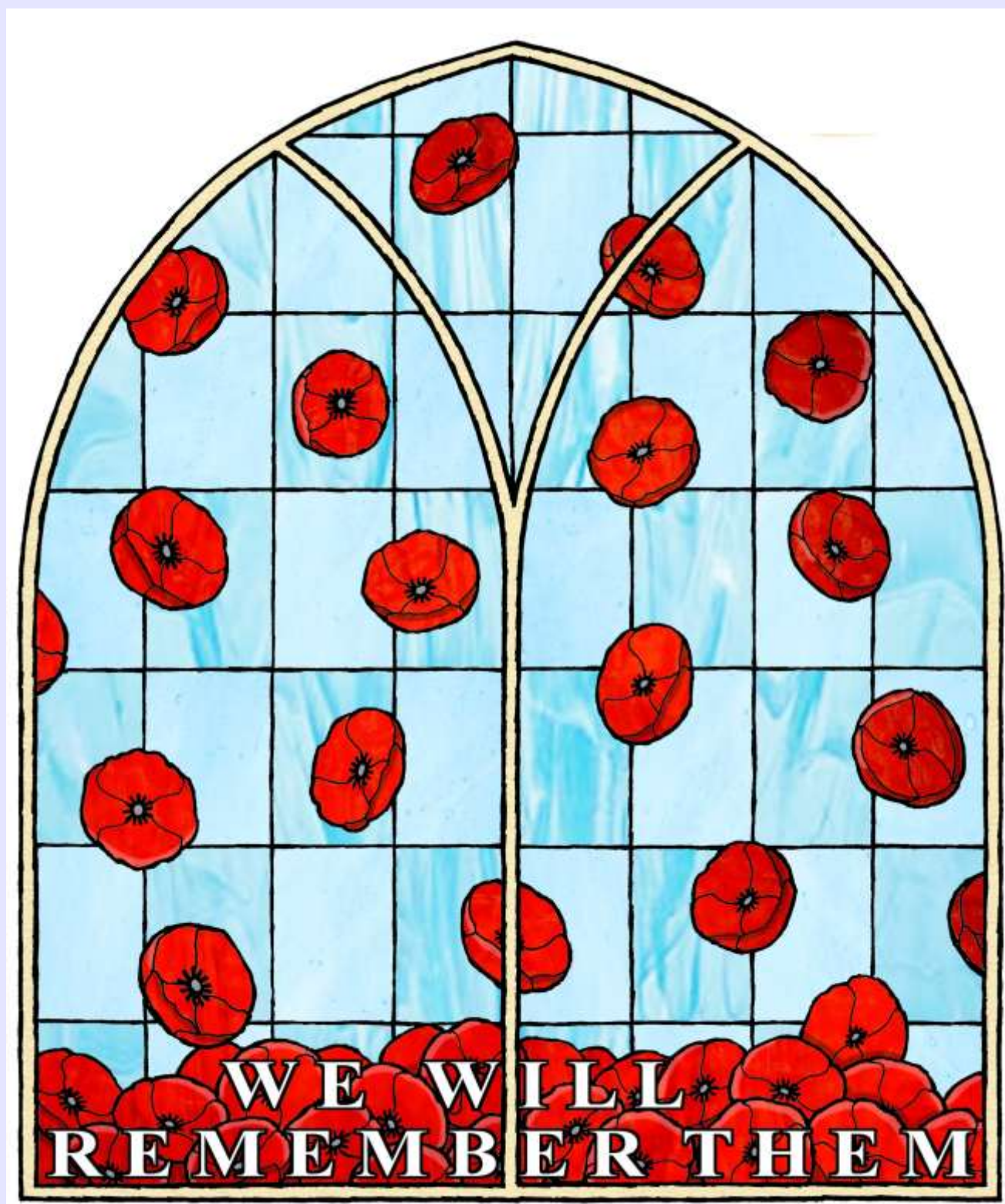

Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

November is a season to Remember. It is a season in the church year when we take time to reflect on life, death and hope. We remember the bond we have, through God, with those who we have known and loved who have died. Our Service to Remember our Loved Ones who have Died on 1st November at 10.30am provides a compassionate and supportive space for us to remember and honour them. There is an opportunity to add a flower (provided by the Church) to a floral display and light a candle to place on the altar in their memory. This service is open to everyone regardless as to where their funeral took place. Perhaps this would be a service that you would find helpful. Perhaps you know of someone recently bereaved who might find this service helpful, please come along to it with them. Perhaps you know of someone whose loved one opted to have no funeral at all so they are left with a sense of bereftness because they haven't been able to say goodbye; please encourage them to come and, if you are able, come along with them.

Remembrance Sunday on November 9th is an opportunity to join with others across the nation as we remember those who have lost their lives through war. In partnership with the local branch of the Royal British Legion, the Parish Council and the other churches in Croxley we will, as always, host the Civic Service of Remembrance at All Saints' at 2.30pm followed by the laying of wreaths at the war memorial on The Green. This act of remembrance is valued very much by the local community as is evidenced by the numbers that attend both in Church and on The Green.

November also ushers in our biggest fund-raising event of the year in the form of our annual Christmas Market which this year will be on Saturday 15th November starting at 11am. With a wide variety of stalls, mulled wine, good food and Christmas music it is an event not to be missed so do come along if you can. If you are unable to come but would like to support us, then do contact the Parish Office (01923 772109) where you can purchase your Prize Draw tickets.

We are delighted to be hosting the Deanery Confirmation Service on Tuesday 18th November at 7.30pm. We have some young people who will be confirmed by Bishop Jane the Bishop of Hertford at this evening so do please come along to support them at this very important step in their journey of faith.

During November we will welcome Year 7 pupils from Rickmansworth School as they come to visit the Church as part of their RE lessons. It is so good to have these links with our local secondary school.

As we draw towards the end on the month, we have an Afternoon Retreat planned to take place on Saturday 22nd November between 1 and 5pm and costs £15. It has an Advent theme of 'Cradled' and will be led by Reverend Vanessa Cole who is a very experienced retreat leader. If you are looking for some quiet space to just be then do join us at Quiet Church on Thursday 27th November at 7.30pm. The Church will be lit by candle-light and you are welcome to come and just sit in the peaceful quietness and beauty of the Church. The quiet time finishes at 8.15pm with the option to join in a short service to mark the end of the day called Compline.

Advent Sunday falls on Sunday 30th November. There will be an Advent evening service at 6pm with Advent hymns, readings and poems to help us reflect on and prepare for the season of Advent.

Sunday Sermons : Characters in the Bible

At our most recent meeting, we discussed how helpful it can be to read different translations of the same piece of scripture. Did you know the Bible gateway website offers this facility?

Using the website at this address: <https://www.biblegateway.com>

You then choose a passage eg. Genesis 1 and then click the drop-down arrow to select the translation you would like. Several translations to compare can open interesting insights we miss when reading just one version.



Secondly, we talked about studying a book of the Bible and how this can be challenging without some background information. The Bible Society has a wonderful resource if you want to spend time immersed in an individual book of the Old or New Testament and read a good overview, and they are only a couple of pages long. 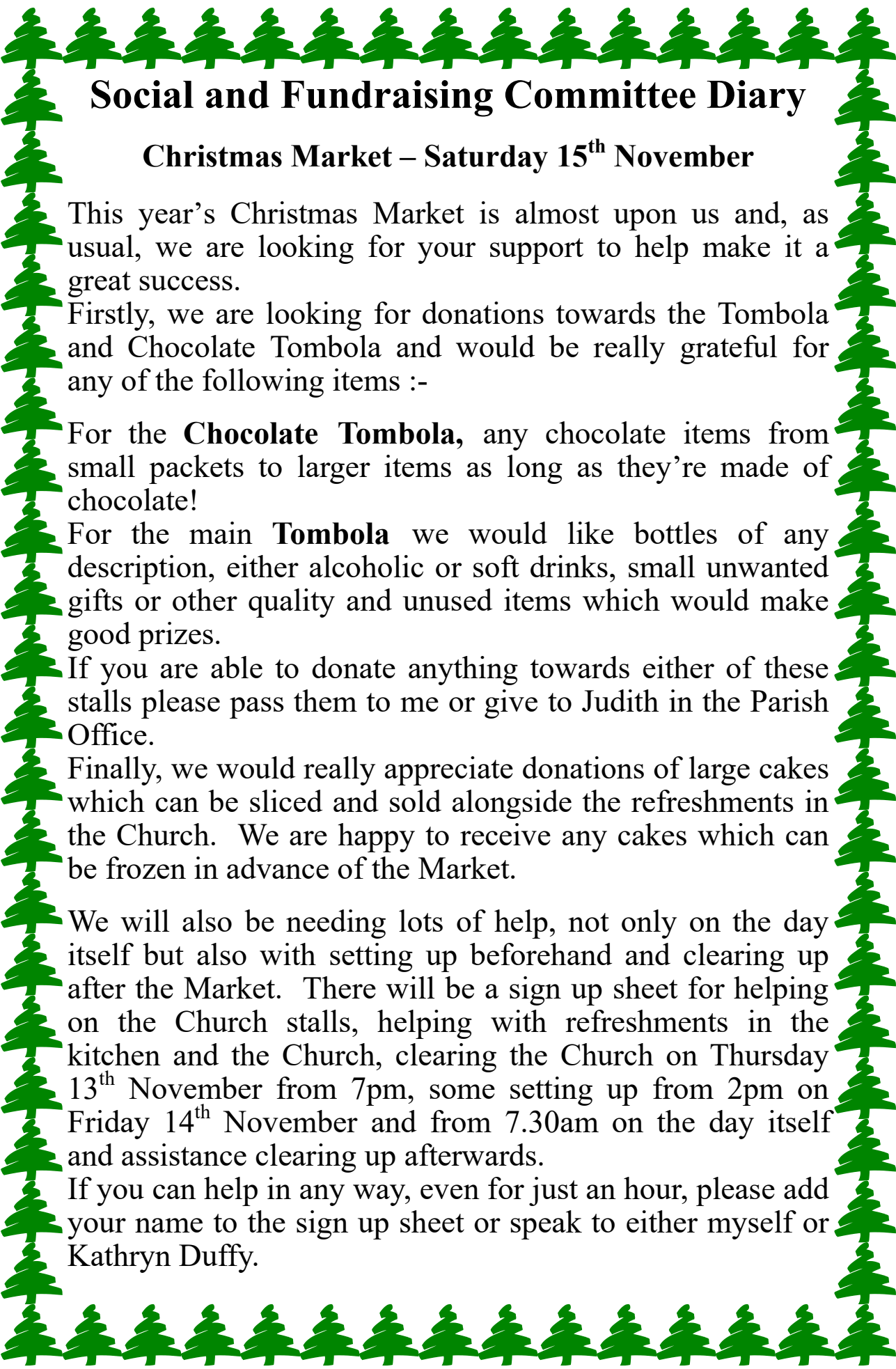

“A defining moment for the Church of England”

King Charles III. October 2025

King Charles is Head and Supreme Governor of the Church of England. But what is the defining moment to which he

is referring? It was on 3rd October with the announcement from Number 10 Downing Street of the name of the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury.

Starting with the appointment of St Augustine in 597, there had certainly been other defining moments, not least when Archbishops of Canterbury stopped being Roman Catholic and became Protestant, at the Reformation, when the Church of England became the country's Established Church that it remains today.



The present ‘defining moment’ is, of course, in case you missed it, that the 106th Archbishop is a woman. A fourteen-century tradition of Archbishops being men has been broken. Downing Street had announced the Right Reverend Dame Sarah Mullaly as the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury and the first woman leader of the Church of England and symbolic centre of the world-wide Anglican Communion.

A former cancer nurse rising to Chief Nursing Officer for England, and at present Bishop of London, she is now Archbishop of Canterbury-designate. Dame Sarah will become archbishop at a ceremony in Canterbury Cathedral next January before her formal enthronement later, perhaps in the presence of the King, almost certainly in the presence of members of the Royal Family.

It is a striking irony that for centuries women have probably provided most of the active members of church congregations. Yet their arrival in the upper reaches of church leadership is only so very recent. St Paul has had a lot to answer for. *I suffer not a woman...to usurp authority over the man.* Of course, the Church has been no different from society at large which has persistently denied women equal opportunities to men across huge swathes of social, educational, economic and political life. And to some extent, still does. But change did begin to happen. Women fought for the right to vote and,

in time, achieved it. Women were elected to Parliament. In 1918 Constance Gore-Booth, Irish aristocrat and serious social reformer and revolutionary, was the first woman elected but could not take her seat as she was residing in Holloway Prison at the time for her part in the Irish uprising. In her case, inequality acted in her favour. Sentenced to be hanged, she was reprieved because she was a woman. The distinction of the first woman to take her seat thus fell to another aristocrat, US-born Viscountess Astor. It took another 60 years for a woman to be elected Prime Minister. Margaret Hilda Thatcher, daughter of grocer and local mayor, Robert Thatcher, became PM in 1979. She had, of course, to wait to be an aristocrat until stepping out of office.

As the 20th century wore on, it was becoming increasingly difficult to argue that if women and men could pursue the same occupations outside the Church they should be able to do so inside. In 1983, New Zealander Dr Penny Jamieson was ordained priest and six years later became Anglicanism's first woman diocesan bishop. The Church of England finally took the hint. Not immediately. A decade later, in 1992, the General Synod passed a vote to ordain women. It was, of course, controversial as expected, and opposed by both the Evangelical and Anglo-Catholic wings of the Church. The Synod had to make concessions.

In 1994, England's first thirty-two women were ordained priests at Bristol Cathedral starting with Angela Berners-Wilson. It is well worth pointing out though that even then *women priests were negotiating a discriminatory terrain at many different levels, especially as discrimination against women was embedded in the Church*. For instance, and among much else, it took time even then (until July 2014) for the Church to accept women Bishops. The first was the Rt. Revd. Libby Lane, consecrated at York Minster in 2015, closely followed by Dame Sarah as Bishop of Crediton in Devon. In 2018 she became Bishop of London, the third most senior Bishop after York and Canterbury, with a seat in the House of Lords.

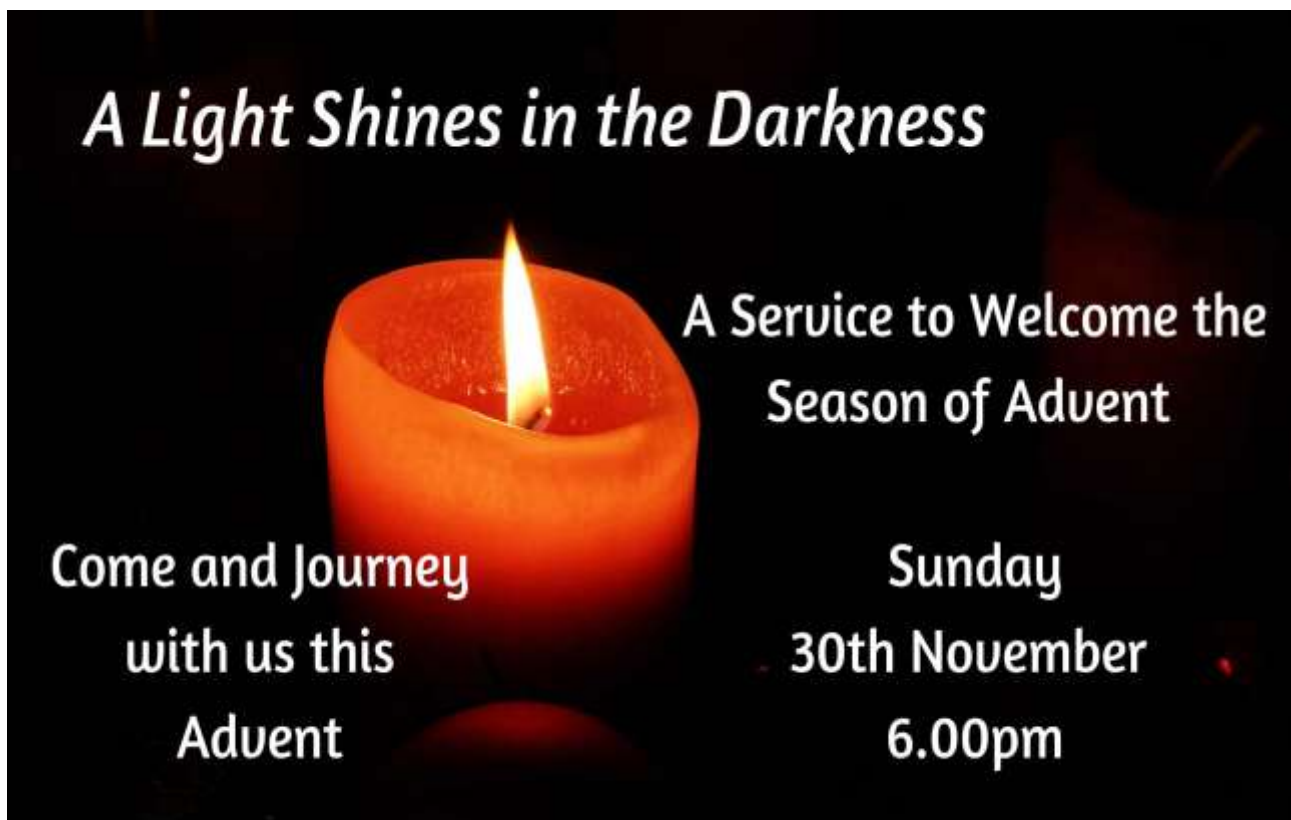


What sort of Archbishop will she be? She inherits a Church divided and troubled. A need to restore trust in a Church reeling from revelations of sexual and other physical abuse, the mishandling of which forced out her predecessor Justin Welby; falling church attendances; formulating the Church's response to the Assisted Dying Bill and the

problems thrown up by attitudes to immigration, legal and illegal and to the evident racism, still a feature of British life. She described the Conservative government's Rwanda policy as *one that would shame us as a nation*. And far from least, attitudes to homosexuality and same-sex marriage; people changing their sex and the problems that follow for other people. As Bishop of London, she described the decision to allow priests to bless same-sex couples as "*a moment of hope for the Church*." She will certainly ordain both men and women to be priests. She is critical of the assisted dying bill, believing it opens the door to the idea that some lives are not worth living and all that follows from it.

Her own attitudes and beliefs. She is clearly more Liberal than Conservative. And as such is up against the Conservative wings of the Church as exemplified by the Conservative Church of England Evangelical Council, which states its aim "to promote and maintain orthodox evangelical theology and ethics at the heart of the Church of England". In a recent letter it said it wanted her to "call the Church of England to recommit to the historic doctrines and formularies entrusted to it." *It is in her in-tray* as the Guardian newspaper has recently written. When, and if, it ever gets into her out-tray is sometime in the future.

Sunday Coffee Charity

We will be supporting the charity, **Sue Ryder**, with our coffee donations for the next three months. Here is a little bit of information about the work of this charity.

Sue Ryder is a British palliative and bereavement support charity based in the UK. It was formed as The Sue Ryder Foundation in 1953 by World War II Special Operations Executive volunteer Sue Ryder. The first Sue Ryder Home in the UK opened in Lady Ryder's mother's house in Cavendish, Suffolk, in 1952. Its first patients were survivors of the concentration camps.

The scope of Lady Ryder's work later widened to include supporting people with palliative and neurological conditions. In 1974, a home for cancer patients was opened. Their centre in Leckhampton also began as a place for people with cancer to be cared for, and was opened soon after.

The work of the charity has changed considerably since 1952. They now provide expert care to people at the end of their lives whatever their health needs. They do this from seven specialist centres and in people's homes.

They also offer bereavement support nationally through their online bereavement resources and advice and they campaign for change so that everyone who is approaching the end of their life or grieving has access to the right support at the right time. They seek to break down the barriers to talking about dying and grief - so we can all be better prepared and better equipped to be there for each other.

As well donations to this great charity through our coffee money donations, you can also donate items at the Sue Ryder charity shops. There is one in Rickmansworth High Street who are always willing to take your donations and maybe you could find items to buy in their shop while you are there.

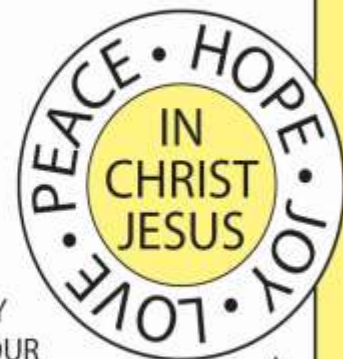
